## Let's not be complacent!

It's fair to say we've had a relatively mild Summer. In the last week we've had temperatures in the mid-high 30°C's but we haven't had the continuous 40°C plus days we've had in previous years.

The Fire Danger Season doesn't end in the Mt Lofty Ranges until **30<sup>th</sup> April**, so we still have a fair way to go. It's important that we still maintain home maintenance in terms of keeping areas around the house clear of dry leaves – the gutters are probably littered with a broad range of leaves and twigs and if we have a sudden downpour the risk of water getting into house under the eaves is possible. The repercussions of this are that they can cause other issues – we have had people with water coming through their light fittings.

We are still likely to have Fire Ban days and it's important you are familiar with what you can and can't do. For more information contact the CFS Bushfire Information Hotline on 1300 362 361 or visit [www.cfs.sa.gov.au](http://www.cfs.sa.gov.au) and click on the Fire Restrictions Menu option.

### Lyndoch CFS Station

This was last mentioned in the June 2011 edition – we had hoped for movement in the intervening months but a number of issues were required to be resolved. These have now been addressed and in late January the tenders closed. We hope to see movement on the station shortly so keep your eyes open.

The building of the station will not have any impact on response activities of the brigade.

### Incidents attended

Since the 1<sup>st</sup> January 2012, Lyndoch CFS has responded to 21 incidents. This brings the total up to 58 for the current financial year.

While most of these incidents have been relatively minor, 3 of them were vehicle related accidents. In one accident on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of January a driver was returning from Gawler on the Lyndoch Valley road near the Lyndoch Hill Retreat when a vehicle travelling at speed can up over the hill forcing the driver to go onto the dirt and come in contact with the poplar trees off on the verge.

What was frustrating was the other vehicle then turned off their lights and continued on towards Gawler – the driver not only failed to stop but also drove without lights with the potential to cause another incident – it was a costly experience for the person in the car as all he was in Gawler for was a carton of milk.

In the last incident on the 17<sup>th</sup> of February a vehicle turned into the path of another on Lyndoch Valley Way – while SA Ambulance was called this was a precautionary measure only.

We ask all members of the community to drive carefully and pay attention.

## Smoke sightings! – What's going on?

Even though the Fire Danger Season is not over in the Mount Lofty Ranges, you may see smoke rising up around. Why? Farmers via the Council can seek permission to undertake burning off of their stubble paddocks – they do however have some obligations.

- 1) They must still seek a permit from the local council Fire Prevention Officer – Schedule 9 for lighting fires during the fire danger season.
- 2) This schedule identifies their obligations they need to abide by which includes the notification of the local brigade on the day of their intention to burn.

The challenge for some of us when we see fire is that it may look closer than it actually is and in some cases it's not even in the Barossa Council area – approved burnoffs in the Light Council area can spread towards the valley as can some in the Adelaide Hills (Gumeracha, Forreton etc).

So what do I do? You can ring 000 and request the Fire Service, they will, based on the information you provide them be possibly able to provide information of burnoffs in the area – if they can't then they will usually ask a number of questions and respond the nearest most appropriate brigade to investigate.

### Chimney / Flue Fire Prevention

With some colder nights starting to occur and even some days, it's noticeable that some households are starting to stoke up the combustion heater.

#### Now is a good time to check if the flue or chimney needs cleaning!

A pre winter check for wood fires includes:

#### Flues:

- Clean the flue using a cylindrical wire brush available from most hardware stores
- Check the flue for corrosion, particularly the sections that are out of sight in the roof cavity
- Check that the flue is central in the heat shield and if the conical shroud on the external heat shield has been dislodged, check for bird nests and accumulation of leaf litter



#### Chimneys:

- Clean the chimney using a wire brush and look out for big chunks of mortar or brick in the soot which will indicate decay inside the chimney
- Check the section of chimney within the roof space for loose or missing bricks or mortar

While you are thinking about your wood heater, consider the distance to the nearest flammable material like a lounge, cupboard or curtains. Has something been moved closer to the fire over Summer that may now present a danger? If you are unsure on what is a safe distance, consult the Operators Manual or check with the supplier

Should your chimney catch fire, please call the fire service immediately and ensure all occupants are accounted for and safe.

Then, use a fire extinguisher if available and where possible, restrict the flow of air to the fire by closing doors and windows. Beware when using water because it will create steam, which can also cause burns.

## Fire Danger Season – Ends 30<sup>th</sup> April 2012

From midnight on the 30<sup>th</sup> April 2012, the Fire Danger Season ends across the rest of the State including the Mount Lofty Ranges and so backyard burning is now allowed.

It is likely that many of us have stockpiled rubbish ready to burn and we would like to remind residents of the following.

### FIRST: THINK FIRE SAFETY!

1. Please ensure there is a four metre clear space around and above your rubbish heap.
2. If you think your rubbish heap is too big or too close to trees or buildings, make several smaller heaps in safer areas. Smaller heaps are likely to burn more efficiently anyway.
3. Please ensure you have a rake or shovel on hand together with a water hose that is capable of reaching to the far side of the fire.
4. Please do not leave the fire unattended at any time.
5. Please be considerate of your neighbours with regards to wind direction and smoke.



### SECOND: THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY (EPA) HAS STRICT RULES FOR DOMESTIC BACKYARD BURNING!

1. Backyard burning is only allowed **Monday to Saturday**.
2. Fires **must not be lit before 10am**.
3. Fires **must be completely extinguished by 3pm**.
4. **Only perfectly dry wood, paper and pruning's can be burnt** in a clean hot burn.
5. Leaves, lawn clippings and other garden refuse should be composted or disposed of via the "Green Waste" pickup service. The Barossa Council encourages these options.
6. It is an offence to burn Treated Pine and items containing plastics.
7. Smoke that is offensive to neighbours is reportable.
8. The only fires allowed at night are home heaters and outside fires principally used for cooking or "comfort fires" not exceeding 1 metre by 1 metre, using clean dry wood.
9. Penalty - on the spot fines may be issued by The Barossa Council or the EPA.

**Bonfires at locations outside township boundaries must not be burnt at night and must comply with items 1 to 7 above.**

### PLEASE NOTE:

- **These are EPA regulations, not CFS or The Barossa Council regulations.**
- **The Barossa Council administers the regulations along with the EPA and SA Police.**
- **The local CFS Fire Brigade only puts out the fires.**

If you require further information on domestic or rural burning, pick up a "fact sheet" from your local Council Office or call Jamie or Chadd at The Barossa Council on 8563 8444, **before you burn a hole in your pocket.**

### LYNDOCH STATION – UPDATE

Just a quick note to say, that as one may be able to see, things are now moving at the site. A number of people have enquired what was happening – some thinking the station has been moved. Quite simply, all being well in approximately 20 weeks, a new Lyndoch CFS Station will rise up on the site. Something which some have been waiting 18 years for. Watch this space.

## Winter Fire Safety!

### Do you dry clothes in front of the heater?

Radiant heat from domestic heaters will readily ignite fabrics particularly synthetics, including clothes, towels and curtains. Please ensure that:

- If damp clothes are dried overnight in front of a slow combustion heater that they are kept at least two metres from direct radiant heat.
- Freestanding heaters are placed so that they cannot be accidentally tipped over or bumped up against furniture or curtains.
- A fire screen is used in front of an open fire is to reduce the risk of a fire being started from sparks or a piece of timber rolling out of the fire.

### Do you have candles burning in your home?

If so, please observe basic precautions which include:

- The candleholder is solid enough and stable enough to hold the candle securely.
- Not leaving candles unattended near soft furnishings or curtains.
- Not using candles as night-lights for children.
- Making sure candles are extinguished before you leave the room.
- Make sure candles are extinguished before you go to sleep.

### Have you checked your electric blankets?

Each winter electric blankets cause a number of house fires. Some of the causes are:

- Frayed wiring at the controller or where wiring is attached to the mattress. If you see frayed wiring do not use the electric blanket.
- Damaged internal wiring. This can result from electric blankets being stored with tight folds, which damages the insulation around the heating coils.
- Electric blankets left switched on for extended periods. The heat build up can be enough to ignite the mattress or bedclothes.

## House / Structure Fires

Besides a fully functional Smoke Detector – there are other items of fire safety equipment that are useful to have around the house. These are a **Fire Blanket** and a **Fire Extinguisher**.



A **Fire Blanket** is useful in the kitchen for dealing with hot oils on the stove that are contained within the pot. Once the item has been covered the fuel source should be turned off and the Fire Service called. A Fire Blanket is usually a single use device and can cost as little as \$20.00



A small **Dry Powder Fire Extinguisher** is another useful piece of equipment which can be used on a majority of the combustible materials, fuels and electrical fire that may occur either in the home or in the car or caravan. A small 1kg to 2.5kg extinguisher is all that is needed. One in the shed may also be useful. A small extinguisher may cost as little as \$30.00.

These two items are available from most hardware stores and even Australia Post stocks these items at their larger Post Offices.

## LYNDOCH STATION \* UPDATE \*




# Lyndoch CFS Grapevine Article – August 2012



## Statistics for 2011 / 2012

Lyndoch responded to 76 incidents over the past 12 months (July 1 – June 30). This is a 16% drop from the previous year where we responded to 90 incidents.



Of note is the following

- 100% increase in Fixed Alarm responses over the previous 12 months
- 80% increase in Vehicle accidents with no injuries
- 82% decrease in Tree Down responses (from 23 to 4)

The average for the past 10 years has dropped slightly to 95.

## Fire Prevention – Starts NOW!

It is likely that the Fire Danger season will start early again this year. This may be subject to change and closer to the Fire Danger Season these dates will be officially published. It is therefore important that you think about preparing your house and surroundings now rather than leave it to the last minute. The rains of late have prompted consistent growth and this should be dealt with before we enter the Summer Months.

In preparation for haymaking, please check mowers, rakes and balers and do pre-season maintenance on bearings, belts, chains and drive shafts to minimize the chance of overloaded or overheating equipment. While you may prevent a fire, you will probably also avoid costly damage, downtime and repairs. While you are checking the machinery, don't forget to fill, check and test Firefighting equipment that you may rely on if a fire does start. The right equipment and quick action to extinguish a small fire have obvious benefits.

It is also time to spray grass around the home, sheds and fence lines as part of your fire prevention strategy. Once the grass has died off, removal of dead grass, leaf litter, twigs and old timber will remove a potential path for fire to reach your buildings.


## What's the Outlook over Summer?

Every year CFS and the Bureau of Meteorology undertake regular assessment of the risk for the coming Fire Season. The following is an excerpt from that assessment.

### Temperature:

The Bureau of Meteorology climate outlook shows that the odds are in favour of warmer maximum temperatures throughout the state, as well as above average minimum temperatures:

The picture shows the chance of exceeding the maximum median temperature over the period October to December 2012



**Grassland fuels:** Likely to be above average fuel production due to rain received.

### Summary:

- The Bureau of Meteorology climate outlook indicates we could expect below average rainfall across the southern areas of the state. The forecast does not indicate the quantity of below average rainfall.
- The year to date (25/9/12) rainfall totals have varied across the state with the north east pastoral recording above average.
- The Bureau of Meteorology temperature prognosis for the next 3 months is for above average temperatures.
- The current risk is Moderate - High, except for the pastoral areas where it is High to Very High.
- Average rainfall over the next 3 month period will be critical in determining the risk. Without average rainfall, fuel may dry out earlier.
- At this stage it appears to be potentially dryer than average season. There are no indications of a wetter spring.
- Some areas across the state will potentially have an increase with the grass / pasture risk due to favourable growing conditions and abundance of growth from previous seasons.

## New LYNDOCH Station!!

For many this has been a long time coming. At last Stage 1 has been completed and as of Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> October 2012 it was handed over by the contractor to CFS for occupation to occur. Work is however on-going and Stage 2 should be starting shortly which will focus on the external surrounds – fences, car parking and general landscaping. This process will take a minimum of 6 – 8 weeks to complete.

Our original station enabled us to store a single appliance only in it and it was a tight squeeze for the new appliance which was slightly high and longer – we now have no worries. The original station consisted of an area of approx 50m<sup>2</sup> which included a small office to a station which is now approx 225m<sup>2</sup>. ## Are you prepared??

We haven't even started Summer officially yet, but already we have seen an increase in the number of incidents we have been responded to. Since the beginning of November, Lyndoch has responded to 14 incidents, a significant number of which have been grass / scrub fire related. Of these a number were started as a result of dry lightning but for some, the cause has been identified as suspicious. While they have not necessarily been in the Lyndoch response area, Lyndoch has supported many of its near neighbours with crews. A member of Lyndoch also went over to the Port Lincoln fires for a number of shifts.

It is with this in mind that we pose the question – are you prepared for a fire in or around your property.

Do you:

- Know what a Safer Settlement, Safer Precinct and Place of Last Resort are for your area?
- Have you developed a bushfire action plan with your family?
- Do you understand what is meant by Severe, Extreme and Catastrophic conditions

If you can answer yes to all of these, then well done – if not don't panic – there are a number of places you can go to get help with this information.

If you click on the Bushfire Ready link you will find all sorts of information on:

- Knowing if you are at risk?
- Activating your bushfire plan?

If you click on the Bushfire Safer Places – look on the right hand side for “The Barossa Council” and follow the link. This will show where the Safer Settlements, Precincts and Places of last resort are.
